

OCTOBER SPINNING AT STAN HYWET

We currently have available slots—both morning and afternoon—for our area at the Stan Hywet Textile Arts and Artisans event. The show runs concurrently with Ohio Mart on October 3 through 6, 2019. It was lots of fun and very well attended last time!

The event will again be held in the Manor House Auditorium with a designated area for each group or guild. Display tables and chairs will be provided. There will be no charge to participate in this event. Last time, we were given passes that needed to be distributed to each participant prior to the show. We are expecting the same this year.

The show is open from 10:00 to 5:00 Thursday through Saturday, and 10:00 to 4:00 on Sunday. So, our shifts will run 10:00-1:30 (morning) and 1:30 to 5:00 (afternoon). Sunday's afternoon session will end at 4:00 with an hour of display take-down until 5:00. Please plan on arriving early enough to be set up and ready to demonstrate when your shift begins.

The demonstrator's parking is a little ways from the Manor House, they will have a golf cart to help us get our wheels to the Auditorium. The Auditorium is down a flight of steps. There is a service elevator for those who need it.

We are not permitted to sell anything. This is demonstration and display only. So bring your hand spun yarn and items made from it for the display table during your shift. If you have a very small loom, you can bring that. Be aware, our area is not big enough for any equipment that is larger than a spinning wheel.



A workshop on fiber breeds, preparation techniques, spinning approach, and end use with Nelly DeVault from the Trading Post for Fibers, Indiana

Friday and Saturday, November 8-9, 2019 from 9 a.m.- 4 p.m.

Come on a journey through time as we explore the history of fiber animals on every (populated) continent! We will focus on the varied breeds of sheep and how people around the world have used these fibers in clothing and art.

We will start close to the Cradle of Civilization with Karakul, move to the long wools and down breeds of the United Kingdom, on to the landraces of Scandinavia, and to the more modern breeds developed to flourish in the American West and Australia. The we'll work our way around to Asia to explore the yak and camel down we love to spin and wear! We will not forget the camelids of South America nor the continent of Africa.

At each stop we'll talk about common uses, and then try the fibers ourselves. There will be a healthy combination of unprocessed fleeces and roving, so you can do as much or as little prep work as you desire. Please bring cards and/or combs if you have them and a working spinning wheel.
