
Next month we will be having a mini mentoring night. Please see Jean's article on what you may need to bring.

LIBRARY NEWS

Watch for the "From the Archives" specials at each of our meetings. These are books/magazines/notebooks of the past that are stored because there is only so much room in the church library cupboard. I have been finding some real treasures in these stored archives.

One of these finds was a 2-booklet set, reprinted in 1965, of a trip Mary M. Atwater took to Guatemala in 1946! Mary M. Atwater (1878-1956) was an American weaver, who is credited with reviving handweaving in America by collecting weaving drafts, teaching and writing. The 2-booklet set is a travel log of her month-long trip with not only textile information but her travel adventures and observations of the countryside with wonderful hand drawn pictures included with the text. A bonus is the folder of woven textile samples that are included.

New books:

"Potholder Loom Designs" by Harrisville Designs. The looper potholders are back bigger than when we were kids. The looms come in the traditional size and a larger 10"x 10" size. Harrisville has custom-made cotton loops of every color and Carol Leigh of Hill Creek Fiber Studio specializes in natural dyed wool loopers. I also purchased a color-card of loopers from Harrisville with the book.

"True Colors" World Masters of Natural Dyes and Pigments by Keith Recker: Recker has presented a book of the personal stories of 26 artisans around the world that specialize in creating color from natural materials. You will love the color!



Color and Design in Huck Lace Towels

With Rosalie Neilson

Huck Lace provides a treasure trove of design for weavers. It is a shaft-efficient weave structure where an 8-shaft loom can produce six blocks of design; and a 4-shaft loom can produce a myriad of different ways to combine 16 different textures of warp/weft floats with plain weave.

You will learn how "blocks" or units of huck lace are threaded on four and eight shafts, and how they can be combined to expand design possibilities within a single threading by changing the tie-up.

Using Design Pages and Transparent Overlays plus a Huck Lace Template from Neilson's book *An Exaltation of Blocks*, you will practice how to convert black and white patterns into 6-block Huck Lace designs.



Rosalie Neilson loves using color and geometric design in her weavings and kumihimo braiding. As both designer and teacher, she was featured in a 2-hour DVD by Interweave Press called *Rep Weave*. She publishes regularly in weaving and braiding journals and maintains an active teaching schedule throughout the United States, Canada, and England. Her most recent book, *An Exaltation of Blocks* is a toolkit of design pages and transparent overlays for exploring symmetric block design.

The towel project for this workshop will consist of three $4\,\%$ " sections of Huck Lace, each a different color, separated by a one-inch stripe of plain weave. The overall width of the project is $16\,\%$ " suitable for looms with a weaving width of 18". For looms narrower than 18" wide, a narrower draft will be sent.

**Pre-workshop threading instructions will be sent via email to registrants. Warp and weft are 8/2 unmercerized cotton in four different colors.

Students will work on their own looms exclusively.

Workshop fee: \$220 members, \$245 non-members

Open to members exclusively now until January 1, 2020, then open to non-members.

Skill level: Advanced Beginners and up

Materials fee (paid directly to instructor on the first day of the workshop): \$20 for a coil bound booklet with Design Pages and Transparencies.

CRACKLE WEAVE WORKSHOP

Crackle weave is an elegant weave structure when woven with fine materials. If you are able to weave Overshot, you can certainly weave Crackle. Both structures are woven on four shafts and both use the same tie up; they are a two-shuttle weave with a shot of tabby alternating with a shot of pattern weft. That is where the similarities ends. Overshot pattern blocks have skips for floats varying from two warp threads to over an inch long. In Crackle, a three thread float is the rule.
