

### **DYE DAY 2020**

Yellow-to-Green, Saturday, September 26

We now don't feel so bad about having Dye Day in September. Hopefully we will be able to meet and enjoy some yellow to green color experiments. Our annual Dye Day will be experimenting with four yellow dyes: Marigold flowers, Yellow Onion Skins, Goldenrod and Osage Orange wood chips. We will dye two skeins with each yellow dye and then top dye one skein with Indigo for a green. You will need 8 skeins, 50 yards each, for the Yellow-to-Green project. Also bring 2 skeins, 50 yards each, for dipping in Indigo for blue. Dye Day will be held at the home of Hollie Krenz, 16100 Cowley Rd., Grafton, 44044 on Saturday, September 26.

Grow and Collect Our Dye Day Plant Material

With a later date for Dye Day, we can take advantage of a summer's growing season to collect Marigold flowers, Yellow Onion Skins and Goldenrod flowers. If you have some extra garden space, plant some Marigolds and clip the blossoms and freeze. Collect the outer yellow skins of your cooking onions. Let them air dry. And the first of August, be on the lookout for Goldenrod to start blooming. The best color comes from these early blooms. Clip the flowers and freeze. I save the plastic sleeves that our newspaper comes in and it is perfect for stuffing with flowers to freeze.

### **DEMONSTRATIONS**



### FACE MASKS

Elaine Hicks has been making masks and shares some tips from experience wearing them for a full day. The pattern she has been using is available at

This pattern has multi sizes and several tutorials. Being a nurse with oncology patients we have been hyper-vigilant to protect our patients as well as ourselves from this current health crisis. Many masks have been donated to the hospitals and we appreciate these so much. Because we wear these masks continuously for 10 or more hours comfort is a major factor. As soon as we enter a SUMMA building we must wear a cloth mask. Then when caring for a patient I am required to wear a N95 and goggles.

Please, please with future mask sewing consider the following tips if able. I use woven cotton for the outer fabric then flannel for the inside lining. The flannel helps absorb the moisture we exhale. This pattern gives an option for make the inner pocket for additional filter material such as furnace air filter.

I know it is all over the internet to use hair ties for the elastic ear straps. No offense and please I hope I'm not upsetting anyone but please DO NOT use this option. They are too short, too heavy and hurt. I wish I could send you all a picture of our valet Doug, his ears looked like Baby New Year because they were so folded forward from the tension. The favorite one my fellow staff like are one large continuous loop made from T-shirt yarn, baby head bands or other such soft stretchy material (actually, most regular elastic is ouchy too). My personal favorite is using one of those tubular bandanas cut at 2cm width with my circular cutter. This style band lets the strap go around back of our neck and over top of head instead of behind our ears. Because it is one large loop that passes through a casing it lets us adjust it comfortably over everything from pony tails and buns to shaved heads.

If you have the sewing ability place a wire in the nose piece. I use a piece of green floral wire folded in half with the cut end bent over to make it not sharp. Pipe cleaners, twist ties work too. This lets us fit it to our face contour, keeps our eye glasses and goggles from fogging up as well as helps keep the mask in proper position. I know we are all so skilled and multi talented, thank you all for your support.

# **Introduction to Sprang**

An ancient technique for today's handweaver

World-renowned instructor Carol James joins the Medina Spinning and Weaving Guild for a two-day workshop on **Sprang**, an ancient handweaving technique that uses your fingers to create a very elastic interlinking stitch. Carol will teach you her amazing way to create two rows of cloth for every one row worked.

Participants receive an introduction to the basic stitch on a frame with ready-to-go warp focusing on the use of the fingers to create the structure. Once the basic stitch is mastered, she will introduce other stitches, pattern reading and adaptations for garments.

Carol has examined the very extensive collection of textiles at the Kelsey Museum, has written patterns for many of the designs, and made replicas of some of them, which she will share that weekend.

Carol James is a world-recognized teacher in Sprang. She has spent the past 20 years rediscovering textile forms that had been considered lost, resurrecting these ancient techniques and making them accessible to everyone through her publications, books and workshops.

Workshop fee: \$200 members, \$225 non-members

Open to members exclusively now until June 1, 2020, then open to non-members.

**Skill level:** suitable for all levels from beginner to advanced. Must have good use of the fingers and reasonable eyesight.

Materials fee (paid directly to instructor on the first day of the workshop): \$45; includes materials for 3 warps and a frame loom to take home.
